






THE MINUTES OF THE GRAND LODGE OF FREEMASONS OF ENGLAND

1740-1758



EDITOR'S INTRODUCTION

The first volume of the Minutes of Grand Lodge (Q.C.A., X) was published in 1913 under the Editorship of Bro. W. J. Songhurst. It was at that time intended that the series should be continued to include all the Minutes of both the "Moderns" and the "Antients" down to the Union. Presumably the outbreak of the First World War prevented the publication of the second volume, but the transcript of the whole of the Minutes down to 1813 was completed and is now in the Library of the Quatuor Coronati Lodge, where, for convenience in handling, it has been bound into 23 loose-leaf binders. After the first War, the membership of the Correspondence Circle fell so low that the finances of the Lodge did not permit of even keeping the Transactions up-to-date, must less publishing further volumes of Q.C.A., and it is only in the last year or two that the enlargement of the Correspondence Circle to nearly 4,000 has permitted us to resume publishing volumes of Q.C.A. Volume XI dealt with the early records of the "Antients", including the Minutes to the end of 1760.

Fortunately, Bro. Songhurst had already prepared his notes on the next 19 years of the Minutes of the "Moderns" in his usual masterly style, and it is these Minutes, with his notes, that we are now able to publish as Q.C.A., XII.

As far as possible the arrangement of Volume X has been followed, although for economy's sake it has been necessary to sacrifice the generous spacing and margins.

Bro. Songhurst's introduction is very brief: probably it is only a part of what he intended to write, but it is all that can be found; and it should be read in conjunction with his introduction to Volume X.

BRO. W. J. SONGHURST'S INTRODUCTION

The Minutes of the Grand Lodge of the "Moderns" here printed include the period of the formation of the Grand Lodge of the "Antients". It is probable that the organisation was not heralded by a fanfare of trumpets, and its equivalent in the public Press of the day, and it may therefore be assumed that a knowledge of its existence would only come gradually to the ears of those responsible for the government of the Premier Grand Lodge. It is, however, somewhat remarkable that until 1754 there is no definite reference to the rival body.

Those who still accept the statements of Preston (Illustrations of Masonry, 1781, pp. 258-260. The statements are repeated, with some verbal alterations, down to the latest edited by Oliver in 1861, and they were adopted by the compiler of the Constitutions of 1784), which have been shown to be without foundation by Sadler (Masonic Facts and Fictions, 1887), date the origin of the "Antients" to the year 1739, when, as we have already seen, some measures were taken to deal with the so-called Society of Honorary Masons, whose connection with the "Antients" no one, however, has attempted.

Others, apparently attaching some importance to the statement of the anonymous author of *Multa Paucis* that "Grand Master *Byron* was very inactive", notice that a number of Lodges were erased during this Grand Master's life (1747-1752), and jump to the conclusion that there is some connection between the two and that these Lodges were responsible for the creation of the Grand Lodge of the "Antients". I have failed to find any justification for this view, and it appears to me to be much more probable that the Lodges went out of existence because their members were engaged in suppressing the rebellion of 1745, and in connection with the subsequent War of the Austrian Succession. In some Lodges the effects of the press-gang would, no doubt, be severely felt, and from others the officers would be drawn to lead the troops.

[a] General James Keith was a cousin of the Earl of Kintore, who was proposed for

election as Grand Master at this meeting, and is said to have appointed Keith Provincial Grand Master of Russia. [Constitutions, 1756, p. 334.]

James Keith and his elder brother George (10th Earl Marischal of Scotland) were attainted for their participation in the Stuart rising of 1715. After seven years as Governor of Ukraine Lames left the Province and the Province of Theorem 1815. of Ukraine, James left the Russian service and entered that of Frederick the Great, and was killed at the battle of Hockirchen in 1758. [See A.Q.C., xxxv, pp. 261, 289.]

It will be noticed that No. 12, which had hitherto met in the neighbourhood of the Strand, now moves to St. Michael's Alley in the City. This is its only recorded attendance from the Cock and Lion. Henceforward we shall find it on one or two occasions coming from the Blossoms Inn, Lawrence Lane, Cheapside, until in 1748 it appears at Chatham, Kent, where it still exists as the Royal Lodge of Antiquity, No. 20.

[b] With the exception of the two Country Lodges, all those included in this list were represented at the meeting. The Lodge at the Red or White Lion, Banbury, was No. 181, and it was erased in 1768. The Jamaica Lodge was No. 182, which lapsed in 1796. No. 183, at the White Swan, Little St. Andrew's Street, Seven Dials, was afterwards called the Lodge of Prudence. In 1793 it joined the Lodge of Peter. - [c] The new law proposed by the Deputy Grand Master was objected to at the next meeting "as being derogatory to the prerogative of the Rt. 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[c] The present Mansion House in the City of London was then quite a new building, the first stone having been laid in 1739. It occupies the site of the Stocks Market (for fish and flesh), which had been established there in 1282. In 1737 the Market was removed to Fleet Market, and in 1829 to what is now known as Farringdon Market.

There were nine or ten Lodges meeting in the immediate vicinity of the Mansion House—Royal Exchange, Bartholomew Lane, Nicholas Lane, Lombard Street and Old Jewry. Seven Dials, Spitalfields and Charing Cross were busine Masonic centres.

Of the contributing Lodges, No. 106, at Forrest's Coffee House, No. 95, at the Turk's Head, Soho, and No. 127, at the Fountain, Gateshead, were not represented. The Lodge at Hamburg which remitted £2 2s. for its Constitution was probably No. 108, dating from 1733. It appears to have lapsed shortly afterwards and to have been re-constituted under the same number in 1740.

I do not agree with the scribe that No. 50 was meeting at the Anchor and Crown, Seven Dials. This Lodge had moved early in the previous year to Count Munich's Head, Golden Square, and its representatives are here noted as coming from that house. The second Lodge at the Anchor and Crown was No. 148. It went there in 1742, and did not move again until 1751. So, too, the scribe has apparently made a mistake in writing "O.L." against the Lodge at Forrest's Coffee House. The Old Lodge there was No. 26, which, in February, 1745, was summoned to show cause why it should not be erased for non-attendance during the previous two years.

The Lodges which paid for Constitution were No. 194, at the Angel, Dolgelly, which was erased in 1780, and No. 195, at the White Lion, Bristol, which lapsed years before its erasure in 1766. No. 14, at the Bull's Head, Southwark, and No. 88, at the Hoop and Griffin, Leadenhall Street, contributed to the Charity Fund, though they are not noted as being represented at the meeting.

Lodges which changed their place of meeting are Nos. 149, from the Magdalen, Old Fish Street, to the Bell, Friday Street; No. 34, from the Three Kings to the Marshal and Anchor, Minories; No. 137, from the Blossoms, Lawrence Lane, Cheapside, to the Buffalo, Finch Lane; and No. 185, from Lebeck's Head, Catherine Street, Strand, to the Three Tuns, Clare Market. It will be seen that No. 35 is entered as at the Swan and Rummer, Finch Lane. Lane has not noted this as a removal, although he did so when the Swan and Rummer, Bartholomew Lane, was first given as the name of the meeting place in 1739. I have not been able to ascertain definitely whether the two descriptions refer to one house. Bartholomew Lane runs northwards and Finch Lane southwards from Threadneedle Street, Finch Lane being a little to the east. Stow (1633 ed., p. 190) says that in 1499 Sir John Tate gave his brewhouse, called the Swan, for the enlargement of the Hospital of St. Anthony, which was situated on the north side of Threadneedle Street.

[b] This Lodge dated from 22nd November, 1738, and paid for its Constitution in December, 1739, but it was not placed on the List until 1740, when it became No. 164. There were two other Lodges in Antigua at this time, and the Leeward Islands are said to have been formed into a Province under the Grand Lodge of England in 1738, with Governor Matthew as Provincial Grand Master (Constitutions, 1756, p. 333). "The Reverend and Honourable Francis Byam, D.D." is similarly said to have been appointed Provincial Grand Master for Antigua in 1754-5 (ib., p. 334).

The Trinity College (Cambridge) Admissions give some particulars of Francis Byam, son of Edward Byam, of Antigua. It appears that he was educated at Westminster School, matriculated from Christ's College in 1726, and became a Pensioner in 1728. In the following year he entered at Trinity, took B.A. in 1730, became Fellow in 1732 and M.A. in 1733.

Of the contributing Lodges, that at Oswestry was 119b, which was erased in 1754. It took the place of a Lodge constituted at the Sun, Old Round Court, Strand, in 1735, moving later to the White Bear, Strand. From this latter house it sent representatives to Grand Lodge in March, 1742. It must, therefore, have lapsed very shortly after that date. The Lodge at Boston, No. 110, had been represented in Grand Lodge on 24th February, 1741. Lodge St. George, at Hamburg, was No. 128, which later joined the Order of the Strict Observance. No. 87 had removed from the Greyhound, Charing Cross, to the Meuse Coffee House. This should be the Mews Coffee House, from the Royal Mews which covered the site of the present Trafalgar Square. This is the only recorded attendance of any Lodge at this House. Before the November meeting, No. 87 had gone to Lebeck's Head, in the Strand. It is not possible to say definitely which Lodge came from Bishopsgate. No. 82 was at the New Magpie, and No. 114 at the Old Magpie there. But No. 82 had not attended for two years, and we hear nothing more of it until 1748, when it is meeting (I believe as a New Lodge) at the Red Lion, St. James' Square.

We have for the first time a meeting place mentioned for the Grenadiers' Lodge, No. 178. It had moved to the Running Horse, Piccadilly, from the Sun and Falcon, Down Street, following the Landlord, William Burridge, who acted as Treasurer. It was at the house of this Brother that the Lodge was meeting at the time of its Constitution in October, 1739, but the name of his house is not mentioned, either in the petition or in the Lodge Minutes. The former states that the Brethren had been assembling and meeting together at the house of our Brother William Burridge in Mayfair, near High Park Corner, and this is repeated in the Minutes of the Constitution Meeting, with the additional information that the house was "in the Liberty of Westminster, and County of Middlesex". This description would be applicable to the Sun and Falcon in Down Street, of which we know that Burridge was Landlord less than three years later.

Lane has a note that No. 56, at the Masons' Arms, Maddox Street, was erased in 1743, and reinstated in 1744. I cannot find his authority for this statement.

[b] The Lodge No. 49, originally at the Red Lion, Richmond, had been meeting at the Golden Sugar Loaf, Great Queen Street, since 1741. In the list of attendances at Grand Lodge this day, it appears for the first time from the Sun, Suffolk Street. It is not easy to understand the nature of the complaint against Charles Payne, the Pastry Cook. John Bridgefoot was evidently the Landlord of the Sun, and it seems clear that he became personally interested in the finances of the Lodge. Judging from the practice in other Lodges, we may suppose that he advanced the money to pay the indebtedness of the Lodge to the Landlord of the Sugar Loaf, but it is not likely to have been so large a sum that he was obliged to entrust it to several of the members one of whom omitted to pay over the was obliged to entrust it to several of the members, one of whom omitted to pay over the amount he received from Bridgefoot. Payne ignored the summonses sent to him and was eventually expelled for contumacy. See *Minutes* of 3rd April, 1747.

According to Lane, no other Lodge ever met at the Post Boy, Sherborne Lane; and no other Lodge met at the King's Head, Poultry, for thirty years after this meeting. The attendance from the Crown & Anchor, Seven Dials, may be either No. 148 or No. 166.

No. 4, at the Shakespeare's Head, Marlborough Street, No. 5, at Braund's Head, No. 90, at the Royal Vineyard, St. James's Park, and No. 194, at Dolgelly, though contributing to the Fund of Charity, were not represented at the meeting. No. 61 had moved from the Bacchus, Bloomsbury, to the Shakespeare's Head, London Spa, Clerkenwell.

The last recorded attendance of Members of this Lodge from the Swan, Southwark, was on 4th April, 1744. Apparently it was after this date that they went to the Marshalsea, and the Landlord of the Swan did not send on to them the notice calling upon them to attend at Grand Lodge and show cause why the Lodge should not be erased. On the adjourned debate at the next meeting, the petition was dismissed and nothing further was heard from the members. It is probably only a coincidence that in December, 1752, a Lodge under the Antients was meeting at the Marshalsea Tap House.

Anyway, the objection seems to have been not against the new meeting-place, but against the irregular manner of removal. Thirty years later a Lodge was held in the King's Bench Prison, and Grand Lodge took action against

No. 211, at Gravesend, is still on the list as the Lodge of Freedom, No. 77. No. 206, in St. Christopher, was erased in 1822. No. 212, at St. Andrew's Cross, Hermitage Bridge, was later known as the Sea Captains' Lodge; it lapsed in 1794. This was the first Lodge constituted in London since April, 1742. I am inclined to think that the six guineas remitted from Minorca were for constitution of three Lodges which had been founded there in the previous year: No. 213 on 9th February, No. 214 on 23rd May, and No. 215 on 24th June. Moreover, neither body was meeting at the Castle Tavern, the Antients meeting at the Griffin Tavern, Holborn, and the Moderns at the Devil Tavern, Temple Bar. Bro. F. W. Levander (A.Q.C., xxix, p. 9) suggests that this was a meeting privately called by Brethren dissatisfied with Lord Byron, with a view to electing a new Grand Master.—ED.]

We have here the last mention of the Union Lodge at Lebeck's Head, No. 87. Lane says that the constitution was surrendered in the following year.

No. 6, from the King's Arms to the Tower, in Tower Street, Seven Dials; No. 49, from the Rising Sun, Suffolk Street, Charing Cross, to the Baptist's Head, Old Bailey; and, apparently, No. 13, from the Queen's Head, Great Queen Street, to the Turk's Head, Wandsworth. I say apparently because it seems probable that No. 13 lapsed soon after its last attendance at Grand Lodge in December, 1747, from the Queen's Head, where it had been meeting since its constitution in 1723. I suspect that the Lodge at Wandsworth was a new creation which took the vacant No. 13 as was certainly the case with another Lodge. a new creation which took the vacant No. 13, as was certainly the case with another Lodge represented at this meeting. No. 179 had been constituted at Leicester in 1739. It lapsed in or before 1744, and its place is here taken by a London Lodge meeting at the Red Bull,

In the list of contributing Lodges is the "King's Arms and One Tun, Gerard Street". This is clearly intended for the King's Arms Lodge, No. 38, which had been meeting at the Bear and Rummer, Gerrard Street, Soho. Lane does not mention a removal to the One Tun, and it seems to have continued to meet regularly at the Bear and Rummer until

The Lodges paying for Constitution are No. 218, at the Bell, Aldgate, which lapsed in 1768; No. 219, at the Fleece, Cheapside, which was on the list until 1801; and No. 220, which had been constituted at the Seven Stars, Truro, in August, 1752. The Lodge at Helston was No. 217.

No Lodge is known to have been meeting at this time at the Queen's (or King's) Head, St. Paul's Churchyard. I have no doubt that the Scribe intended No. 1 which came from the Queen's Arms. The words King's Arms Lodge are written over an erasure. No. 68 had moved from the Mitre, Aldgate, to the Sun, Fish Street Hill; No. 100, from the Old Cheshire Cheese to the Queen's Head, Chelsea; and No. 102, from the Five Bells to the White Swan, Strand.

The Lodges which paid for Constitution were Nos. 223, at the Hague, erased in 1759; No. 224, at Nottingham, erased in 1758; No. 225, at the Lion and Goat, Hanover Square, afterwards called the Old Cumberland Lodge, which joined in 1818 with the Lodge of Fortitude, forming the present No. 12; No. 226, at Burton's Coffee House, Doctors Commons, erased in 1806; and No. 227, at the Angel, Piccadilly, now the United Lodge of Prudence, No. 83. Possibly the remittance from Madras was intended to include the fee for constitution of No. 222, which had been formed in 1752. The Lodge at Calcutta, No. 183b, is the present Star in the East, No. 87. No. 2, at the Horn, Westminster, No. 21, at the Griffin, Deptford, and No. 43, at St. Alban's Street, were not represented at the meeting.

None of these are now in existence. The Lodge at Carolina, which sent £12/12/- for Constitution, was not entered in the lists until 1755, when it came under the new enumeration as No. 213. It still exists at Wilmington, on the Roll of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina.

Lane identifies (Mas. Records, 1895, p. 102) the Lodge at the Fox, Castle Street, Southwark, as No. 248, and I have no doubt that this is correct. But I think he is mistaken in saying that the Lodge lapsed in 1755. My opinion is that there has been a confusion with No. 67/1740, which is said to have moved in 1755 from Ludgate Hill to the Fox in Southwark, the other side of the River. Such a removal seems to me very unlikely, and I believe it was No. 67 that lapsed. It had not attended Grand Lodge since 1753. [b] The second edition of Anderson's Constitutions was published in 1738, and the title page states that it was "Printed for Brothers Caesar Ward and Richard Chandler, Booksellers, at the Ship without Temple-Bar; and sold at their shops in Coney-Street, York, and at the Scarborough Spaw". In 1744 the firm became bankrupt, the unsold copies passed into the hands of another publisher, and were re-issued in 1746 with a new copies passed into the hands of another publisher, and were re-issued in 1746 with a new title page, which has the imprint, "London: Printed; and sold by J. Robinson, at the Golden Lion in Ludgate Street". It is remarkable that Jonathan Scott should have been the one to complain of a Bookseller who "for his private advantage threatened to reprint" the Constitutions, for in this very year, 1754, there was published a new edition of the Pocket Companion, with the imprint of "J. Scott, at the Black Swan, in Duck Lane, near West Smithfield", and this book is certainly based upon Anderson, brought down to the Grand Mastership of Lord Carysfort, to whom it is dedicated. The third edition of the Constitutions, officially issued in 1756, was "Printed for Brother J. Scott, at the Black Swan in Pater-noster Row", and it contains an advertisement of his Pocket Companion. We shall see later that Scott's financial arrangements with Grand Lodge in connection with the publication of the Constitutions proved to be very unsatisfactory. Begemann (Vorgeschichte . . . der Freimaurerei in England, II, 221) says definitely that Entick was the Author of the 1754 Pocket Companion.

No. 50 had moved from the Masons' Arms, Westminster, to the Golden Horseshoe, Southwark; No. 73, from St. Paul's Head, Cateaton Street, to the Half Moon, Cheapside, where No. 22 was then meeting; No. 245, from the Cripple, Little Britain, to the Star, Aldersgate Street; No. 147, from the Blue Posts, Old Bond Street, to Chapman's Coffee House, Sackville Street; No. 84, from the Black Lion, Rosemary Lane, to the City of Carlisle (or Carlisle Cathedral), Shoreditch; and No. 82, from the Red Lion to the Dog, St. James'. On 26th September, 1754, the Grenadiers Lodge, No. 178, moved to the Kings Arms and One Tun, Hyde Park Corner. There is no record in the Minutes of this Lodge of an earlier removal from the Running Horse to the Horse Grenadier, as noted by Lane, and I am inclined to think that these are merely two descriptions of the same house.

None of the Lodges which paid for constitution are now in existence. No. 242, at the Swan, Ramsgate, had already paid at the June meeting. No. 243, at Leeds, was erased in 1776; No. 250, at Leicester, in 1760; No. 251, at Lowestoft, in 1773; No. 252, at Charage Cross, in 1775; while No. 253, at Redruth, afterwards known as Druid's Lodge of Love and Liberality, lasted until 1838.

Other contributing Lodges, which were not present, are No. 9, at the Kings Arms, New Bond Street; No. 174, at Basseterre; No. 198, at the Bear; and No. 205, at the Guild, Norwich.

No. 231 had moved from the Queen's Head, Holles Street, to the King's Head, Bolsover Street; No. 22, from the Half Moon, Cheapside, to the Bell, Noble Street; No. 149, from the Three Tuns and Bull's Head, Cheapside, to the Sun, Milk Street; No. 14, from the Swan, Smithfield, to the Windmill, Rosemary Lane; No. 166, from the Anchor & Crown, to the Red Lion, Seven Dials; No. 177, from the One Tun, Strand, to the Hoop and Grapes, Coventry Street, where also No. 190 was meeting; No. 247, from the Wheatsheaf, Lambeth, to the Swan, Westminster Bridge Road; and No. 8, from the Sun, Milk Street, to the Crown, Leadenhall Street.

Of the contributing Lodges, No. 131, at Norwich, and No. 250, at Leicester, were not represented at the meeting. The words "for Constitution, as the amount had been sent up in November, 1753. No. 255, at Maidstone, was constituted in connection with the King's Own Regiment of Foot, which afterwards served for a number of years in Canada. The Lodge lapsed in 1789 after the Regiment returned to England. The last one which paid for constitution did not come on the List until 1756, when it was entered as No. 212. It was erased in 1773. The total contributions add up to £49/17/6 only. [Perhaps the Stewards' Lodge is a mis-entry for their normal two guineas.—ED.] guineas.—ED.]

[e] Dermott says (Ahiman Rezon, 1778, xvii) that the members of this Lodge never had any connection with the Grand Lodge of the Antients; otherwise it might have been suggested that a Lodge constituted by that body in 1756, which three years later is found to be meeting at the Weavers' Arms, Pelham Street, Spitalfields, was the result of this erasure. Dermott also tells us that the members of the Lodge at Ben Jonson's Head "drew up, printed and published, a Manifesto, and Masons Creed; (sold by Owen in Fleet Street) which did honour to their hearts, and heads". No copy of the pamphlet is known to exist. [See A.Q.C., lxxi, p. 47.—ED.]

It is important to note that the Lodge at the Fish and Bell, Soho, was one of the Four Old Lodges which joined in forming Grand Lodge in 1716. It is now the Lodge of Fortitude and Old Cumberland, No. 12. We know that the Lodge of Antiquity never adopted the "alterations in the established forms" which had been ordained by the Grand Lodge of the Moderns, but adhered to the "ancient practices" right down to 1809 (A.Q.C., xxiii, p. 38), and it might have been expected that its members also would have voted in favour of the Lodge at Ben Jonson's Head. had any connection with the Grand Lodge of the Antients; otherwise it might have been

I am doubtful about the Lodge at the King's Arms, Tower Hill. No. 237 had been meeting there since its constitution in February, 1754, but apparently it had now moved to the White Hart, Goodman's Fields. Both Taverns are, however, entered in the List of attendances, while the contribution to Charity appears as from the King's Arms. There are also two attendances from the Three Tuns, Smithfield, one of which may have been intended for No. 144, at the Three Tuns, Spitalfields.

No. 263 had moved from the Swan, Upper Mount Street, to the Admiral Vernon's Head, Audley Street; No. 259, from the Swan, Covent Garden, to the White Hart, James' Street; and No. 102, from the Five Bells, Strand, to the Cross Keys and Rummer, Henrietta Street, Covent Garden. This combination of the Cross Keys and the Rummer seems to indicate that the two houses had been amalgamated.

Of the Lodges which paid for constitution, No. 264, at the Shoulder of Mutton,

Of the Lodges which paid for constitution, No. 264, at the Shoulder of Mutton, Norwich, lapsed in 1791. The others did not come on the List until after the closing up of the numbers, which seems to have taken place at just about the date of this meeting, of the numbers, which seems to have taken place at just about the date of this meeting, though the result did not appear until the new engraved list was issued towards the end of February, 1756. In this List the Lodge at Chester appears as No. 203; that at the Flower in Hand, Norwich, as No. 206; that at Sunderland as No. 207; that at St. Christopher as No. 123, it having been constituted in 1742; that in Virginia as No. 205; and that in Hanover as No. 208. No. 206 is the present Social Lodge, No. 93, and No. 207 is the present Phoenix Lodge, No. 94. No. 208 joined the Order of the Strict Observance in 1765, and perhaps still exists under the Grand Lodge Royal York of Friendship in Berlin.

The Lodge at the Pelican, Leicester, No. 250/187, was not represented at the meeting.

The house entered as the Prince of Wales' Arms, Leicester Fields, was the White Hart and Prince of Wales' Arms, in Cranbourn Alley. The new Lodge at this house evidently paid for its constitution, as did No. 209, at Chester, No. 211, in Captain Bell's Troop in Lord Ancrum's (Eleventh) Regiment of Dragoons, and No. 212, at the Sun and Thirteen Cantons, Great Pulteney Street. No. 76, which sent a contribution from Colchester, and No. 2, at the Horn, Westminster, were not represented at the meeting.

At this period there was no Lodge in New York under the English Constitution, but it is stated that Lord Carysfort had deputed George Harrison to act as Provincial Grand Master there. (Constitutions, 1756, p. 334.)

I have assumed that the scribe wrote Samson and Lion, Cornhill, instead of Samson and Lion, East Smithfield, but it is just as likely that he intended Cock and Lion, Cornhill, where No. 82 was then meeting. I feel sure that there has been some confusion between Nos. 109 and 122. Both Lodges were certainly meeting at the Hoop and Grapes, Coventry Street, down to the middle of 1755. Both are said to have moved to the King's Arms, Wellclose Square, in 1756, and while we now find No. 109 at the White Swan, Shoe Lane, No. 122 is said to have gone back to the Hoop and Grapes, with a further removal to the White Swan. It will be seen that No. 184 had moved from the Star, Aldersgate Street, to the St. Paul's Head, Doctors Commons.

No. 10, at Chatham, No. 26, at St. Alban, St. Alban's Street, and No. 147, at Yarmouth, were not represented at the meeting, though they contributed to the Fund of Charity. The entry of payment for constitution of the Lodge "said to be at Liverpool" has been altered, and is not easy to read; apparently it was first written "to sit in Manchr", but the Lodge was evidently No. 214, dating from 15th April, 1755, which first met at the White Lion, Water Street, Liverpool, and remained on the list until 1823.

No. 23 had been meeting at the Pope's Head, Cornhill, and its representatives attended from that house down to November, 1754. There is no further reference to the Lodge in these Minutes, but it is included in the list given in the Constitutions of 1756 (page 335). It must have lapsed during 1756, as its number was given to a Lodge constituted in December of that year at Stockton-on-Tees, Durham, which at this meeting contributed to the Fund of Charity. For particulars of the transfer, see *Historical Records of Freemasonry in Stockton-on-Tees*, 1928.

The Lodges which paid for constitution are No. 215, at Amsterdam, which joined the Grand Lodge of Holland in 1757, and No. 217, at the Rising Sun, Air Street, Piccadilly, now the Burlington Lodge, No. 96. The second payment by the last-mentioned Lodge is not easy to understand. It seems unlikely that the Grand Officers received new Aprons, &c., at each newly constituted Lodge, and in this case they certainly did not benefit at all, for the cash equivalent of their "Cloathing" went direct into the Fund of Charity. Similar entries will be noticed at later dates, and eventually London Lodges were charged £4/4/for Constitution

for Constitution.


