Synopsis of the paper

The Francken Manuscript Revisited

Jointly authored by S. Brent Morris & Josef Wäges

Henry Andrew Francken was a naturalized British citizen from the Caribbean. Étienne Morin appointed him a Deputy Inspector General of the twenty-five-degree Order of the Royal Secret. Morin was the presumed founder of the Order, which transformed into the Rose Croix (or the Ancient and Accepted Rite or the Scottish Rite).

The Bibliothèque Nationale de France has a leather-bound manuscript from c.1769 known as the *Santo Domingo Manuscript* from the Baylot Collection (FM4 14). Its author is believed to have been Morin, and Francken translated several copies into English. These translations are known as the "Francken Manuscripts."

The first paper discussing the second known copy of the *Francken Manuscripts* was by A. R. Hewitt in *AQC* 89 (1976), and our knowledge has expanded rapidly. A workshop on the *Francken Manuscripts* was held at the Grand Orient de France as part of the 2015 World Conference on Fraternalism, Freemasonry, and History.

Since then, two additional *Francken Manuscripts* have been discovered, the bookplate in the Santo Domingo Manuscript has been identified with Morin, and intriguing details about Francken's life have come to light. This paper will summarize what is known to date about these intriguing documents.

Bro. S. Brent Morris, PhD, has been managing editor of the *Scottish Rite Journal* of the Supreme Council, 33°, Southern Jurisdiction, USA, editor of *Heredom*, the transactions of the Scottish Rite Research Society, a mathematician with the US federal government, and an instructor at Duke, Johns Hopkins, and George Washington Universities.

He is a former Distinguished Lecturer of the Association of Computing Machinery and author of *Magic Tricks*, *Card Shuffling*, *and Dynamic Computer Memories*. He has lectured on the mathematics of card shuffling at more than 100 US universities as well as Queen Mary College, University of London, before the Lord Mayor at the Mansion House, and at the Magic Circle London.

He is Past Master (1979, 2000, 2017) of Patmos-Solomon's Lodge No. 70, Savage, Maryland, Past Master (2008) of Quatuor Coronati Lodge No. 2076, a Fellow of the Philalethes Society, and a member of many other Masonic organizations. He is author of many articles and books on Freemasonry, including *The Complete Idiot's Guide to Freemasonry*.
